Health Care Update

The Health Care Bill put forth by Governor Schwarzenegger and Senator Fabian Nunez failed to pass the Senate Health Committee and died. This was a relief and a triumph after all the work put forth by the League of Women Voters, Health Care for All Californians, the California Nurses Association and many other groups. During the hearing, the LWVC Lobbyist, Trudy Schaeffer, did a masterful job in her testimony.

Here is the report of Andrew McQuire, of Health Care for All, who attended the hearing:

Yesterday was the first COMPREHENSIVE hearing on ABX 11, the Rube Goldberg Special. We must thank Senator Kuehl for shining daylight on this monstrously complex legislation that supporters call Health Care Reform. And, we must thank the state Legislative Analyst, Liz Hill, and her staff for an objective report on the fiscal problems with ABX 1 1, a report that I found devastating for the supporters of ABX 1 1, and we must thank the staff of the Senate Health Committee for presenting another devastating analysis. I won't attempt to summarize the hearing (I was only present from 9:00am until 5:30pm) which lasted until 8pm. However, here are the key points, as I see it:

- 1. The proponents are formidable and much is at stake for them. The Governor and Nunez are counting on victory in order to display their leadership, accrue power, etc. SEIU, AARP, Health Access and other supporters believe (for economic or philosophical reasons) that they see the "truth" and wish to solve the health care crisis with this "work in progress" legislation. In short, for them ABX 1 1 is better than the status quo.
- 2. When ABX 1 1 is scrutinized some horrible facts emerge. . It is not better than the status quo. Instead, ABX 1.1 would "mandate" the creation of an additional 3 or 4 million private insurance policy holders who would not be able to afford using their policies. High deductibles will render the policies useless; a person making \$40,000 or \$50,000 per year doesn't have a spare \$5,000, \$7,500 or whatever the deductible becomes, to spend on their health care before their policy kicks in? And this doesn't include co-pays, an additional financial burden for the "mandate" class of people. Proponents say that if a mandate is too expensive, a person can petition to opt out of the mandate. If a person opts out of the state mandate they opt to, yes, you guessed it, no coverage.

3. Most importantly, the Legislative Analyst concluded that reasonable projections of expenditures for the ABX 1 1 plan would outstrip revenues within 5 years. The plan goes bankrupt rather quickly. It is important to note that the Leg Analyst testified that she did not project a "worst case" scenario in her report. Imagine if economic times became rough; could happen, no?

In short, ABX 1 1 is too costly for poor people to use and it will go bankrupt. As long as the insurance industry is part of the "health care reform," failure to solve the health care crisis is guaranteed.

A Summit is being held in Los Angeles February 21-23 to determine the future of single payer legislation. Watch for the update next month as a look into our future.

Financing Our League

Torrance League supports its activities through dues, fund-raising, and donations. This year, funds are running low, and we are facing the possibility of dipping into reserves to meet increased costs, including the probability of an increase in the per-member payments (PMP) we are required to make to one or more of the umbrella leagues. (As you know, the membership dues you pay annually to the Torrance League automatically provide membership in the national, state, and county Leagues and contribute to the support of each of them.)

Our League is seriously looking into fund-raising activities to augment income from dues and welcomes donations. A contribution to the Torrance League of Women Voters is not tax deductible because of our advocacy activities, but a contribution made to the LWVT Education Fund is totally tax deductible. Immigration Study

LWVUS has undertaken a study of immigration in order to establish a position from which to advocate. Torrance and Beach Cities leagues participated in the study by forming a joint committee to study the issues related to a set of discussion questions formulated by LWVUS. Study materials were provided on the LWVUS website. The questions were published in the October and November *LWVTVoters*. Following their study of the issues, the joint committee then held two open meetings where the questions were discussed and consensus sought. Following are the results reached [in brackets] at the local meetings for question 1. Results for questions 2-6 will be published in future issues of the *LWVTVoter*.

Question 1: Federal immigration laws should take into consideration criteria such as the following:

- a. Ethnic and cultural diversity [Lower priority]
- b. Economic, business and service employment needs [High priority]
- c. Environment impact/sustainability [Lower priority]
- d. Family reunification of authorized immigrants and citizens with spouses and minor children [High priority]
- e. History of criminal activity [High priority]
- f. Humanitarian crises/political persecution in home country [High priority]
- g. Immigrant characteristics (health and age) [Lower priority]
- h. Rights of all workers to safe working conditions and livable wage [No consensus]
- i. Rights of families to remain together [Higher priority]
- j. Rights of individuals in the U.S. to fair treatment under the law: fair hearing, right to counsel, right of appeal and humane treatment [No consensus]
- k. Education and training [Lower priority]

Question 1 part 2: Three most important criteria (rated by each person)

- 1. Economic, business and employment needs
- 2. Reunification of authorized immigrants and citizens with spouses and minor children
- 3. Rights of families to remain together

The League's Birth

From the spirit of the suffrage movement and the shock of the First World War came a great idea - that a nonpartisan civic organization could provide the education and experience the public needed to assure the success of democracy. The League of Women Voters was founded on that idea.

In her address to the National American Woman Suffrage Association's (NAWSA) 50th convention in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1919, President Carrie Chapman Catt proposed the creation of a league of women voters to "finish the fight" and aid in the reconstruction of the nation. And so a League of Women Voters was formed within NAWSA, composed of the organizations in the states where woman suffrage had already been attained.

The next year, on February 14, 1920, six months before the 19th amendment to the Constitution was ratified, the League was formally organized in Chicago as the National League of Women Voters. Catt described the purpose of the new organization:

"The League of Women Voters is not to dissolve any present organization but to unite all existing organizations of women who believe in its principles. It is not to lure women from partisanship but to combine them in an effort for legislation which will protect coming movements, which we cannot even foretell, from suffering the untoward conditions which have hindered for so long the coming of equal suffrage. Are the women of the United States big enough to see their opportunity?"

Maud Wood Park became the first national president of the League and thus the first League leader to rise to that challenge. She had steered the women's suffrage amendment through Congress in the last two years before ratification and liked nothing better than legislative work. From the beginning, however, it was apparent that the legislative goals of the League would not be exclusively focused on women's issues and that education aimed at all of the electorate was in order. For almost 90 years, the League has helped millions of women and men become informed

participants in government. And it has tackled a diverse range of public policy issues.

From the beginning the League took action on its stands; for several years, through effective lobbying, the League got selected issues included in the platforms of both major political parties and worked for enactment of legislation furthering its program goals. Over the years many procedural changes have been made in the way League program is defined, adopted and structured, but through all the changes the basic concept of study-member agreement-action has remained constant.
